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

On 14 October, 2012 a two-phase scheme to plant wildflowers on the Foss bank at Willow Bank in New Earswick was started by a group of residents as part of the Good Life Initiative. This was supported by Joseph Rowntree Housing Trust and New Earswick Sharing Together (NEST) and funded by the New Earswick Parish Council. It is planned to continue the project in the near future with meadow wildflower

planting, but this has still to be confirmed.

A month later, on 17 November, the Good Life and New Earswick residents planted copse trees from the Woodland Trust's

Jubilee Woods project on Willow Bank green. The group was joined by Cllr Keith Hyman, Lord Mayor of York, and planted 420 trees, including hawthorn, hazel, silver birch, rowan, cherry and dogwood. A Royal Oak sapling from one of the Queen's estates was planted by The Lord Mayor. This project was also supported by Joseph Rowntree Housing Trust and The Conservation Volunteers.

In September 2012, Will Durrant found another dead otter on the roadside just across from Lock Cottage.

Three days before, Will had informed the Joseph Rowntree Trust that the otter fence, installed to protect the colony of otters on the Foss, had been vandalised. When the river floods, the otters cross the road to reach the pond in the Nature Reserve, some being killed.

This otter, a young female, measured

an impressive 38 inches (97 cm) nose to tail. Will had to bury her, as the Environmental Agency's body store for research animals is full. Sadly, this is at least the seventh otter to be killed on this road in the past five years.

Also in September, birdwatcher Peter Richmond found another dead otter, killed on the ring road north of New Earswick. Sex or age of this animal could not be determined, as it was too decomposed.
